

Community Tree Rebate Program



The SDG&E® Community Tree Rebate Program enables qualifying residential customers throughout the region to plant trees to help provide direct environmental, health, and economic benefits. This program is designed for customers in parts of SDG&E’s service territory where trees may be needed to help make a positive impact in their community.

Qualifying SDG&E customers can receive a \$25 rebate for planting or potting a 1-gallon tree, \$35 rebate for a 5-gallon tree and a \$50 rebate for a 15-gallon tree. Customers can apply for up to five (5) rebates annually. Customers do not need a yard to qualify, as trees can be planted in large containers on outdoor balconies or patio areas.

Eligible Zip Codes

Residential Customers must fall in qualifying zip codes. If you do not live within the below zip codes, you may be eligible for another SDG&E tree program – visit sdge.com/TreePrograms to find out more.

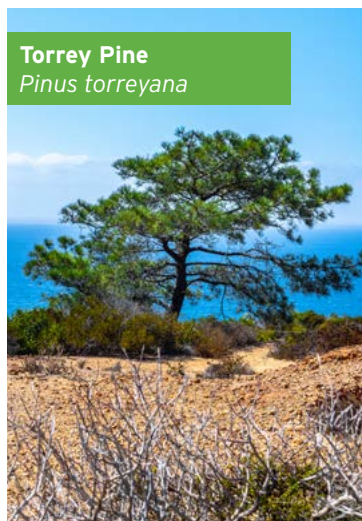

Native Trees

The trees in this section are specifically native to San Diego County. These trees are well adapted to the environmental conditions of our service territory. Native trees require less water than non-native species and support local biodiversity.

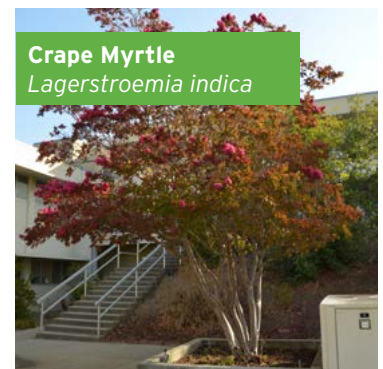

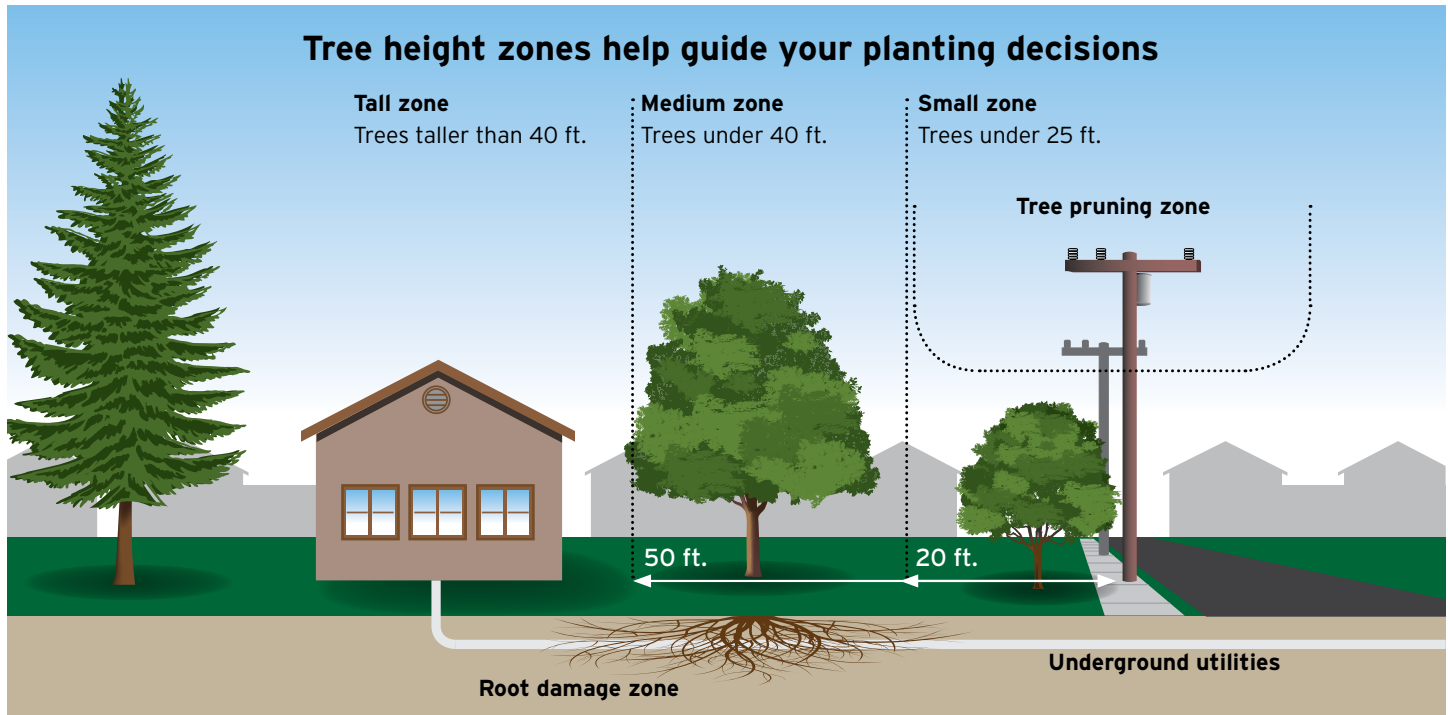

Overhead power lines on your property?

If you do, it is important to plant the right tree in the right place.



Is this tree suitable for my area and lifestyle?

When deciding which trees will be best for you, visit selecttree.calpoly.edu/ and use the SelecTree Guide to research your tree and find out if it is suitable for your climate, planting zone, lifestyle, etc. For example, some trees may drop a lot of seeds and leaf litter; think about if that is something you want to deal with.

Help prevent power outages and fires by planning before you plant.

Start with the planting trees that are popular locally and compatible with overhead power lines. Then browse our tree planting guide at sdge.com/TreeGuide to learn more about trees that interest you. You'll also find tips on planning and planting.

Know what's below before you dig.

At least two working days before you break ground, call Underground Service Alert at **811** or submit a location request at digalert.org to have the location of buried utility-owned gas pipelines marked first. With this free service, you can avoid the dangers and expense of damaging underground utilities. Have a qualified professional locate gas lines that belong to you – typically those that run from the meter to your gas appliances. Learn more at sdge.com/Your-Gas-Lines.

How will you water these trees?

Consider whether or not you have irrigation installed. Keep in mind each tree needs 5 gallons of water twice a week for the first year. For example, 10 trees would require 100 gallons of water per week. Smaller plant species will need less water. Talk with your local nursery about the best species for your property.
